Roses Have "Prickles"

A rose is a perennial flower, shrub or vine of the genus *Rosa*, within the family *Rosaceae*, that contains more than 100 species and comes in a variety of colors. The species form a group of erect shrubs, and climbing or trailing plants, with stems that are often armed with sharp "prickles."



Roses are best known for their flowers. Roses are popular flowering garden shrubs. They are also grown as cut flowers, as one of the most popular and commonly sold florists' flowers. A few roses are grown for scented foliage.

While the sharp objects along a rose stem are commonly called "thorns," they are actually "prickles" — outgrowths of the epidermis (the outer layer of tissue of the stem). Rose prickles are typically sickle-shaped hooks, which aid the rose in hanging onto other vegetation when growing over it.

Despite the presence of prickles, roses are frequently browsed by deer. A few species of roses only have vestigial prickles that have no points.



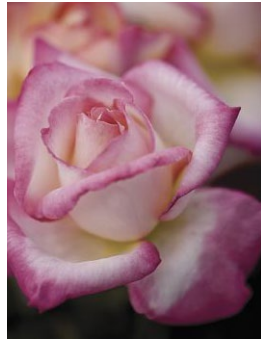

Knock Out Roses

Members of the Knock Out® Family of Roses are easy to grow and do not require special care. They are the most disease-resistant rose on the market. They have stunning flower

power with a generous bloom cycle (about every 5-6 weeks) that will continue until the first hard frost. All of the Knock Out® Roses are self-cleaning, so there is no need to deadhead.

The Knock Out® Family of Roses is winter-hardy to USDA Zone 5 and heat-tolerant throughout the entire U.S. They thrive in almost every area of the country. In the coldest regions, they will need winter protection.



Hybrid Roses

The hybrid tea rose, a cross between hybrid perpetuals and old-fashioned tea roses, are rose royalty. They are the most popular rose in the world and, perhaps, the most popular flower. Hybrid teas have all the virtues you look for in a flower: beauty, fragrance and easy care. Hybrid teas generally produce only one blossom at the end of the stem, rather than clusters of flowers.

Climbing Roses

There is very little that is more beautiful or that looks more magical when incorporated into your landscape than a climbing rose (right). Or enjoy the beauty and simplicity of a Tree Rose (below) on your patio or in your garden.



Other types of roses include Drift (Carpet) Roses and Floribundas. Full Features carries a wide selection of types and colors. You are sure to find the perfect one for your garden.

Caring for Your Roses – Roses adapt well to many different environmental conditions, but proper care after planting is essential.

Watering – Roses must have good drainage, and perform best when they have abundant water. The soil around the roots should always be damp – but never saturated with standing water. Add water when the soil is dry in the upper 1 to 2 inches.

Thorough, deep watering is important. Water should be applied slowly enough to prevent surface runoff and long enough to ensure deep soil penetration. Soil should be soaked to a depth of at least 1 foot each time you water.

One of the best methods for watering is the soaker hose that has many fine holes, which produce a fine mist that is slow to run off. Don't water with a strong stream from the hose. This compacts the soil, causes erosion and spreads disease.

Mulching – Place mulch 2 to 3 inches deep over the bed or around individual plants. This helps keep the roots cool and moist, and reduces watering. Keep the mulch about 6 inches away from the base of the plant to aid in watering.

Fertilizing – Roses need proper fertilization. You may use either inorganic or organic fertilizers, but a combination of both often provides best results. Inorganics are quicker-acting and more concentrated. Organics are more slowly available and contribute fertility over a longer period of time.

Diseases & Pests – Black Spot is one of the most common diseases which affects roses. Pests such as aphids and Japanese beetles often damage roses as well. Proper treatment, immediately upon identifying a problem, is essential to maintaining the health of your roses.
